子Best Job Interview Tips for Job-Seekers 文/機械三甲林昌衡

Last December, I found an opportunity that Singapore CBM corporate provides an internship program in this year's summer break. This is a great opportunity for me because I always wanted to work oversea to challenge myself. Therefore, I made a personal promise to myself that I'll do whatever it takes to pass the interview. Luckily, I did it! Now, I would like to share my English interview experience and tips. Wish you good luck.

English interview isn't horrible.

This is my first time interviewing for a job and also is my first English interview. Many Taiwanese will inevitably feel dishearten when they know there is an English interview due to lack of confidence in English in-prompt-to speaking. I think you should think positive because you have the chance to interview and others doesn't have this opportunity.

Conduct Research on the Employer, industry, Job Opportunity.

Do your homework! Do some research about the industry, company, and job context so you have a basic concept and grasp of the job that you are applying. The more research you conduct, the more you'll understand the job, and the better you'll be able to answer interview questions. For example, I check throughout the CBM's web pages to get some information such as the industry and corporate philosophy. At the same time, I acquire lots of information from my senior Mr. ZHENG, DIAN(鄭典) who previously completed his internship at CBM corporate and knew lots of insight about my interviewer.

Dress for Success.

Plan out a wardrobe that fits the organization and its culture. Remember that it's always better to be overdressed and to wear clothing that fits and is clean. Keep accessories and jewelry to a minimum. Try not to smoke or eat right before the interview — and if possible, brush your teeth or use mouthwash.

Arrive on Time for the Interview.

On time means five to ten minutes early because there is no excuse for ever arriving late for an interview. Arrive about 10 minutes before your scheduled interview to complete additional paperwork and allow yourself time to get settled. Also, arriving a bit early is a chance to observe the dynamics of the workplace.

Make Good First Impressions — to Everyone You Encounter.

Be polite and offer warm greetings to everyone you meet — from parking attendant or receptionist to the hiring manager. Employers often are curious how job applicants treat staff members — and your job offer could easily be derailed if you're rude or arrogant to any of the staff. Make a strong first impression you could by dressing well, arriving early, and when greeting your interviewer, stand, smile, make eye contact, and offer a handshake.

Ask Insightful Questions.

Studies continually show that employers make a judgment about an applicant's interest in the job by whether or not the interviewee asks questions. Thus, even if the hiring manager was thorough in his or her discussions about the job opening and what is expected, you must ask a few questions. And never ask about salary and benefit issues until those subjects are raised by the employer!



Succeeding in job interviews takes research, practice, and persistence. The more effort you put into your interview preparation, the more success you'll see in obtaining job offers. Thank you and I wish you luck!

Sometime, there were some good chance to improve my Chinese, for example, I joined the class in the department of Chinese literature and I talked in Chinese about my Chinese-learning experience, and I joined the Japanese culture festival and I talked in Chinese about Japanese delicious food. At that time, I was able to make many Taiwanese friends! After that, I ate lunch or dinner with them. Some took me go out. I was really happy! This is how I thought that "Time Flies."

Next, I want to write the good points of Taiwan. At first, delicious food. I think the meals are very reasonable although I don't know how Taiwanese people think about this. For example, the individual hot–pot is only 120NT\$ which is very reasonable! Also there are many local dishes that I fallen in love to. I like fried chicken, soft tofu, and bubble milk tea. Actually, I got fat after coming to Taiwan. Moreover, Taiwan is good for trip because the transportation cost is very low compared to Japan. If you have 2 days, you can go anywhere in Taiwan.
